VANCOUVER IN THE 1900'S

VANCOUVER FACTS

- Prohibition began at midnight on December 31, 1915, more than 4 years before the nation went dry under the Volstead Act and the 18th Amendment.
- The Ku Klux Klan made its first appearance in Vancouver on March 11, 1922, and it grew in power by portraying itself as a patriotic Christian group. They held a large open-air ceremony in August 1924, with a flaming cross as the centerpiece. There were 500 clansmen in the entire regalia present and an estimated 10,000 spectators.
- Two significant industries were brought to Vancouver by the opening of Bonneville Dam on the Columbia River in 1938.
 - The Ross Complex, in operation since 1939 to distribute hydroelectric power throughout the Pacific Northwest and used for research and testing, maintenance construction operations, and storage and handling of hazardous and nonhazardous waste
 - o Alcoa became the first company to build a plant in Vancouver two and a half miles from the city with low electricity prices.

INTERSTATE BRIDGE

Before the bridge was built in 1917 (opening day) it was an overcrowded ferry system operated by Pacific Railway, Light & Power Co. Plans. The first bridge has a total of 13 steel spans, with three measuring 275 feet (84 m) in length and the remaining ten spans 265 ft (81 m) each. Piers sit atop pile caps on wooden pilings approximately 70 feet deep. One of the 275-foot (84 m) spans is the lift span for allowing river traffic under the bridge. The lift span is capable of moving 136 ft (41 m) vertically and provides 176 ft (53.6 m) of clearance below when fully raised. The towers are 190 ft (57.9 m) tall, above the

roadway. The original paved roadway was 38 ft (11.6 m) wide and had a 5 ft (1.52 m) wide sidewalk. It was the first automobile bridge across the river between Washington and Oregon, and the second to span the river at all, after the Wenatchee Bridge of 1908. It was originally a toll bridge costing 5¢ per vehicle or per horse and rider, equivalent to \$1.06 in 2021. In 1928 the states of Washington and Oregon jointly purchased the bridge from the counties and discontinued tolling the following year.

The Washington Territory Legislature of 1885-86 passed a bill to build the Washington School for Defective Youth. On February 3, 1886, the eleventh territorial governor signed a bill into

WHERE IS THE 1ST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH
IN DOWNTOWN VANCOOUVER?

Built in 1912, 4 years after a fire destroyed the original 1885 church. Because the basic structure, basement and framing of the building proposed for renovation were really built in 1885, it was impossible to save the 108 year old building. The church was demolished in 2020 because it was no longer structurally safe.

There will be 24 homes on the 2.37 acre strip at 5708 NE 119th St. The development plans to be done in 18 months and offers homes between \$589.000 for 900 square ft and \$629,000 for 1,300 square ft. project. So, when I joined the Amberglen Good Works Committee (AGW), I knew that was the project I wanted to bring to the group. Karl was still on board, so we started to plan a free library with a few extra touches. It will be a free library to share books, games and puzzles, but will also have a shadow box to display messages, a flyer box, and 3 small wire baskets to share extra fruits and veggies. We are working on the project now and hope to have it installed within the next few months."



Karen and Craig are appreciated very much by teammates for the creativity they bring to the group. The Amberglen community will benefit greatly having them in our neighborhood. Besides, if it wasn't for Karen and Craig, you might find Woody raiding your gardens of all of those delicious strawberries and tomatoes!

KEEP AMBERGLEN BEAUTIFUL! AGW NATIVE PLANTINGS PROJECT

The Amberglen Good Works native plantings project, spearheaded by Tiffany and Dave Kullgren, was originally proposed on Town Square in April of this year. Their ideas generated enthusiastic support from many members of our community. At the encouragement of AGW steering committee member Ron Rowe, the couple presented their plans at our August meeting. Dave and Tiffany live adjacent to the "big, ugly dirt patch," where 67th Avenue meets 114th Street, and felt they could contribute towards solving the big, ugly problem. In Tiffany's words: "I got the idea from the Oregon white oaks that are already near there and googled 'native plants with Oregon white oaks.' I found Conserving White Oak in Urban and Suburban Landscapes, which had been done by Mark Griswold Wilson and Ted Labbe, and was funded by Clackamas, Tualatin, and West Multnomah soil and water conservation districts. I used this as a reference guide, as they had already done all the work including listing the native companion plants." Using the measurements of the area that her husband provided, Tiffany selected native companion plants and drew up plans, even though, as she puts it: "I'm not a landscape architect, just obsessed with native plants." Then drawing from their past experience with native plants, they used a source already familiar to them. "We have purchased native plants from Sparrowhawk Native Plants for our yard and knew that the plants would cost less if we ordered them through their site; and they already had an Oakscape tab (https://sparrowhawknativeplants.com/collections/oakscape), so it made the whole process easy!" Tiffany's passion for native plants is evident when you hear her talk about them: "I would like to share that our area is home to oak savannah ecosystems. I did not know this and I'm a native Oregonian! So, I thought that was really cool and maybe other people will, too! Another great example of our oak savannah landscape that people can visit is https://www.fws.gov/refuge/ridgefield/visit-us. We went to visit and it's a beautiful place, where you can even do a drive-through tour." Additionally, she says, "I wish I had known more about native plants before we planted our yard. We would have planted more natives! The plant I am most excited about, but does not look like much, is Roemer's fescue. Per the Sparrowhawk Natives website: it was once common in our oak savannas but has been overtaken by invasive weeds. So, a chance to plant Roemer's fescue helps bring it back to our area." The Kullgrens' infectious enthusiasm for their project, it's a clear benefit to our community, and the many residents showing an interest in it made it easy for the AGW steering committee to rally behind their efforts. Dave and Tiffany have already done most of the planning work; the hurdles that remain for the project are ones that AGW can help with: obtaining approval from the HOA, Architectural Review Committee, and Clark County; soliciting donations from our community, if necessary; and providing volunteers to help with any manpower requirements. There has been good progress:

- Obtaining approval from governing bodies has already begun, and thus far, the signs are good.
- The total cost for the native plants purchased through Sparrowhawk Native Plants will be \$174.05, though there will also be some additional costs for soil mix and bark dust. The HOA may assume some of the costs, but there's no final word on that yet. If you want to pledge your support, please contact AGW, at amberglengoodworks@gmail.com. You'll be contacted only in the event that HOA financial support becomes unavailable.
- Planting is scheduled to begin after mid-October, to give the plants a full rainy season to get acclimated. The AGW will call for volunteers as that time draws near.

The native plants project appears to be headed for success, propelled by the dedicated work of passionate community members, as well as the support provided by Amberglen Good Works. The AGW has had success in the past with marshaling resources to support community projects, and is confident that those experiences will help with this project. Tiffany concludes: "I wanted to mention that if you drive around and see the new developments, including the ones across 119th: The land has been cleared, but the Oregon white oaks remain! They cannot cut them down! So, I learned a lot from doing this...! Thank you to the AGW for letting me do this. I love the NW and anything I can do to help the environment amongst all the development makes me happy!"

SEPTEMBER FUN FACTS

FASCINATING FACTS ABOUT SEPTEMBER BABIES

HISTORICAL EVENTS

- **September 2, 1666**: The Great Fire of London was started, completely destroying the old city located within the ancient Roman Walls. It was believed to have started in a bakery and took three days to put out.
- **September 5, 1774**: The 1st Continental Congress was called to order. Comprised of delegates from all 13 American colonies, it served as the governing body during the American Revolution, from 1774 to 1789. - **September 1, 1878**, Alexander Graham Bell appointed Emma M Nutt the world's first female telephone operator. Her trailblazing career lasted for almost 35 years.
- **September 14, 1901**: President William McKinley was shot on September 6, 1901 while attending the Buffalo Pan-American Exposition in New York. He passed away eight days later.
- **September 1, 1939**: In the early morning hours of this day, Hitler invaded Poland, starting World War II in Europe. Der Führer called the move a "defensive" retaliation against the persecution of Germans in Poland.
- September 11, 2001: 4 airliners were hijacked as part of a series of attacks against the United States. The Twin Towers in New York City were hit by one plane each, American Airlines Flight 11 and Flight 175, while American Airlines Flight 77 crashed into the Pentagon in Washington, D.C. The 4th plane, United Airlines Flight 93, believed to be headed for the White House, crashed into a field in rural Pennsylvania after the passengers overtook the hijackers and the plane.

SEPTEMBER TASTY TIDBIT

CHEESY LEMON-CHICKEN PASTA

INGREDIENTS

- 16 ounce package linguine pasta
- 1 cup frozen peas
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 cup sliced & sautéed mushrooms
- ½ cup diced onion
- 3 cups skinless, boneless chicken breasts cut into chunks

- Salt & ground black pepper to taste
- 4 oz cream cheese, cubed & softened
- ¼ cup fresh lemon juice
- 2 teaspoons lemon zest
- ½ cup grated Parmesan cheese
- ¼ cup grated Pecorino Romano cheese
- ¼ cup chopped flat-leaf (Italian) parsley



DIRECTIONS

- 1. Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Cook linguine at a boil until tender yet firm to the bite, about 11 minutes, adding frozen peas during the last 2 minutes of cooking time. Drain pasta and peas, reserving 1 cup cooking liquid.
- 2. While the pasta is cooking, heat butter and olive oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add mushrooms and onion; cook until mushrooms are brown, 5 to 7 minutes.
- 3. Season chicken with salt and pepper. Cook in the same skillet over medium-high heat until browned and no longer pink, 7 to 10 minutes. Add the mushrooms back to the skillet. Add cream cheese, lemon juice, and lemon zest; stir until cream cheese is melted. Remove from heat.
- 4. Fold in Parmesan and Pecorino Romano cheeses, then parsley. Toss with pasta and peas, adding reserved cooking liquid as necessary to make a sauce.

VEGETARIAN RECIPE - ROASTED ZUCCHINI CASSEROLE

INGREDIENTS

- 3 medium zucchinis, sliced
- 2 medium onions, sliced
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- salt and ground black pepper to taste
- 1 (16 ounce) package penne pasta
- 1 (28 ounce) jar marinara sauce
- ½ cup grated Parmesan cheese



DIRECTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F
- 2. Toss zucchinis and onions in a large bowl with olive oil until evenly coated. Spread vegetables into a large baking dish.
- 3. Roast vegetables in the preheated oven until golden, about 30 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. Reduce oven heat to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- 4. Fill a large pot with lightly salted water and bring to a boil. Stir in penne and return to a boil. Cook pasta uncovered, stirring occasionally, until cooked through but still firm to the bite, about 11 minutes; drain.
- 5. Lightly grease a 9x13-inch baking dish.
- 6. Heat marinara sauce in a saucepan over medium heat until sauce is hot. Spread hot marinara sauce into the prepared baking dish, followed by penne pasta and zucchini mixture. Sprinkle Parmesan cheese atop vegetables.
- 7. Bake in the preheated oven until sauce is bubbly, 35 to 40 minutes. Allow casserole to rest for 5 minutes before serving.






CROSSWORD PUZZLE
