COLUMBIA RIVER GORGE HISTORY

For those of us whom are not familiar with some of the beautiful sites of our great state of Washington, here is some history about the Columbia River Gorge that might peak your interest.

The Columbia River Gorge formed as far back as the Miocene (roughly 17 to 12 million

years ago), and continued to take shape through the Pleistocene (2 million to 700,000 years ago). During this period the Cascade Range was forming, which slowly moved the Columbia River's delta about 100 miles (160 km) north to its current location. Although the river slowly eroded the land over this period of time, the most drastic changes took place at the end of the last ice age when the Missoula Floods cut the steep, dramatic walls that exist today, flooding the river as high up as Crown Point. This quick erosion left many layers of volcanic rock exposed.https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Columbia River Gorge - cite note-nwcouncil-3

The gorge has supported human habitation for over 13,000 years. Evidence of the Folsom and Marmes people, who crossed

the Bering land bridge from Asia, were found in archaeological digs. Excavations near Celilo Falls, a few miles east of The Dalles, show humans have occupied this salmon-fishing site for more than 10,000 years. The Columbia River Gorge has drawn people for more than 13,000 years. The Indian People flourished along the Columbia River – making their clothing from cedar bark and animal skins; building homes where they comfortably survived cold winters; thriving

on abundant runs of salmon and steelhead, as well as sturgeon, smelt, and eel speared and pulled from this tremendous river's rapids and pools. A vital source of livelihood thousands of years ago, as it is today, their strategically located Columbia River homeland became the center for northwest trade among tribal nations. Trade goods found near Wakemap Mound included pipestone from Minnesota, turquoise from the southwest, dentalium from Vancouver Island, and copper from the far north. For thousands of years, the Columbia River Gorge has been the pathway connecting the Pacific Northwest to the rest of the continent.

French Canadian "voyageurs" ventured into the Columbia Gorge area in search of beaver following the 1804-1806 expedition of Lewis and Clark. These, and the subsequent expeditions of botanist David Douglas, ornithologist John Townsend, and others into this plentiful land of fish, fur, and timber beside the "great river of the west" stirred the nation's interest. Then, during an 1824-36 evangelical movement, Jason Lee headed for Oregon as a missionary, followed in 1836 by the Whitmans, and the Spauldings. The immigration encouraged by the missionaries' letters and reports caught fire in the 1840s; fanned by economic depressions and outbreaks of disease in the east, and concern over British domination of the northwest.

By 1849, 11,500 emigrants had endured the hardships of the Oregon Trail and reached The Dalles at the eastern end of the Gorge. With the coming of these white settlers, the indigenous people – ravaged by successive epidemic diseases from the mid-1700's through the 1850's - were displaced, for the most part, from their traditional lands; forever changing life in the Gorge.



Because the steep-cliffed Columbia River Gorge proved impassible, The Dalles became the western terminus for Oregon Trail wagon travel. From here, the early emigrants braved the dangerous Columbia River – some losing the battle with the treacherous rapids of this wild (pre-dam) waterway. Making the situation even more difficult, boat owners charged steep transit prices and often times long waits preceded theses expensive – and risky – services. In 1846, Samuel Barlow opened a toll road up-and-over the southern flank of Mount Hood, giving emigrants a choice - the expensive, risky


run down the river, or the cheaper, but still treacherous, overland route across the backbone of the Cascade Mountain Range. Steamboats, railroads, and highways replaced canoes and rafts, as the Columbia River Gorge remained a major transportation route through the Cascade Mountain Range. Improved transportation systems encouraged economic development. Lumber mills, woolen

mills, flour mills, fruit canneries, fish wheels, and fish canneries dotted the landscape. Today, the river still carries grain, livestock, lumber, fruit, and vegetables grown and processed in the Columbia Basin; and remains the pulsing artery between the Pacific Northwest and the rest of the continent. Prior to the construction of the Barlow Road, the only practical option for many immigrants to the Willamette Valley along the Oregon Trail was to convert their wagons into rafts at the Dalles. Many died or lost their possessions in the attempt to convey their wagons via rafts



through the Cascades Rapids. In November 1986, Congress made the gorge the second U.S. National Scenic Area and established the Columbia River Gorge Commission as part of an interstate compact. The experimental designation came in lieu of being recognized as a national park, which would require the existing industries in towns along the river to relocate. The designation was initially opposed by residents fearing government encroachment, due to restrictions in the plan for items such as building paint colors, and was also opposed by conservationists who feared additional development in the








WHAT'S NEW AT NE 99TH STREET?

In order to improve cross circulation in the area, Clark County will be improving NE 99th Street, between NE 94th Avenue and NE 117th Avenue (SR-503). The proposed design will install the missing segment of roadway, between NE 94th Avenue and NE 105th Avenue, at the north end of the closed Leichner Landfill. The closure is expected to last at least 20 days but may be extended as needed. An exact end date of the closure is weather dependent. Drivers will be diverted onto a detour route. To reduce the impact of increased traffic along the detour route, the contractor will place temporary asphalt speed bumps along the detour route prior to the start of the closure. The temporary speed bumps will be removed by the contractor as soon as the closure ends and the detour is no longer needed. The closure will allow a contractor to make necessary utility upgrades to prepare for future construction of a roundabout at the intersection. Construction of a roundabout is part of a larger project to improve traffic circulation on Northeast 99th Street between Northeast 94th Avenue and Northeast 117th Avenue (SR-503). The project at Northeast 94th Avenue will connect Northeast 99th Street between Northeast 94th Avenue and Northeast 105th Avenue, at the north end of the closed Leichner Landfill. Future improvements in the area include construction of roundabouts at the intersections of Northeast 99th Street with Northeast 107th Avenue and Northeast 110th Avenue/112th Avenue.



SR 14 - I-205 TO SE 164TH AVENUE AUXILIARY LANES

With more traffic using State Route 14 than ever before, this project will construct new lanes of travel in both directions of SR 14 between I-205 and Southeast 164th Avenue in Vancouver to help ease congestion and improve travel reliability and safety.

As soon as Monday, Oct. 3, travelers on SR 14 will begin to see orange construction signs and temporary barriers along the westbound shoulder of SR 14 between I-205 and 164th Avenue. Travelers on both directions of the highway will be shifted to narrow lanes of travel, and may experience slight delays while crews work to construct new travel lanes and widen shoulders throughout the length of the project. Travelers should reduce speeds and watch for work crews when traveling through the work zone.



AGW PROPOSED PROJECTS UNDER CONSIDERATION


The following candidate good works projects are currently being considered by the AGW steering committee. Many of the projects require further research and additional details will be provided as they become available.

AGW LITTLE FREE LIBRARY

Karen Williams has proposed that we install a Little Free Library in the vicinity of the mailboxes, where it would be readily available to all of us as a one-stop information center. The library would include a bulletin board, a container for disseminating flyers, a drawer for dropping off notes and suggestions to AGW, and baskets below for sharing fruits and vegetables. 2022 AGW HOLIDAY POTLUCK AND FOOD DRIVE

It was proposed that AGW host a holiday potluck dinner that would also serve to collect canned food for the Clark County Food Bank. A sub-committee has been formed to investigate the feasibility of hosting the event. They will evaluate whether enough people would attend to make it worthwhile, investigate possible locations where the event could take place, and provide a proposal at the October steering committee meeting about how the event will be organized. Members of the sub-committee include Nina Davenport, Sheila Knipper, Deb Rowe, Chuck Polacek, Don Covert, and John Grant. If you have any ideas you'd like to suggest, please contact one of them. It was also proposed



that this be an annual event, and that canned foods be collected at every steering committee meeting.

<u>AGW SNOW PATROL</u>

Winter weather can bring stressful and sometimes hazardous conditions. It has been suggested that a volunteer group (the "AGW snow patrol") be formed that would check on neighborhood residents during times of heavy snow. Tasks that would be performed could include:

- Bringing fireplace batteries to anybody in need of them.
- Knocking snow from trees and shrubs to prevent damage
- Clearing driveways and sidewalks (if we can get enough able-bodied volunteers)
- Other ideas?

Not everybody would necessarily want to have these services performed for them. We would maintain a list of neighbors who would want at least a knock on the door. We could also issue an alert during heavy snows to see if anybody needs immediate help.

AGW CHRISTMAS CAROLING

It was proposed that AGW organize a group of carolers for the holidays. The carolers would gather in several areas of the neighborhood (hauling a wagon full of hot chocolate, glühwein, and cookies!) and encourage residents to come out and join in the caroling. FASCINATING FACTS ABOUT OCTOBER BABIES


- October-born People are die-hard Romantic.


THE GHOSTLY VISIT (DEB'S FAMILY)

OCTOBER TASTY TIDBIT

PUMPKIN PASTA

INGREDIENTS

- 2 ½ pounds pumpkin
- Non-aerosol cooking spray
- Salt and pepper
- About ¼ teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg
- 1 bulb garlic, ends trimmed to expose the cloves
- 1 teaspoon crushed red pepper

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 425°F.
- 2. Place water on to boil for pasta.
- 3. Peel and split pumpkin or squash (reserving seeds), spray half with oil and season with salt, pepper and nutmeg. Roast until tender, about 45 minutes.
- 4. Spray the garlic with oil and season with salt and pepper. Wrap in foil and roast 45 minutes.
- 5. Peel and chop the remaining squash into small bite-sized pieces, spray and season with salt, pepper, nutmeg and red pepper. Roast until golden at edges and tender, about 30 minutes.
- 6. Wash ½ to 1 cup of the pumpkin seeds and spray and season with salt and pepper. Toast on small tray until golden and crisp, 15 to 20 minutes.
- 7. Scrape the flesh of the halved pumpkin into a food processor, add the roasted garlic cloves removed from the skins and the crème fraiche, then purée. Place in pan and whisk in the stock.
- 8. Cook pasta 1 minute less than the package instructions. Reserve ½ cup pasta water just before draining.
- 9. Combine hot pasta with sauce, half the bite-sized pumpkin and the cheese, adding some pasta water, if needed. Top with remaining bite-sized pumpkin, toasted seeds, chives and chili oil (if using)


SPICED APPLE UPSIDE -DOWN CAKE

INGREDIENTS


- 1 jar (14 ounces) spiced apple rings •
- 6 tablespoons butter, softened
- 1/2 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup sliced almonds, toasted
- 1 egg
- Whipped cream, optional
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1-1/2 teaspoons baking powder

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Drain the apple rings, reserving 1 tablespoon syrup; set apple rings aside.
- 2. In a small saucepan, melt 2 tablespoons butter; stir in brown sugar and reserved syrup until smooth.
- 3. Spread evenly in a greased 9-in. round baking pan; sprinkle with almonds.
- 4. Top with apple rings; set aside.
- 5. In a large bowl, beat the egg, milk, vanilla and remaining butter.
- 6. Combine flour, sugar and baking powder; gradually add to egg mixture until well blended.
- 7. Spoon over apple rings.
- 8. Bake at 350° for 35-40 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.
- 9. Cool for 10 minutes before inverting onto a serving plate. Serve warm.
- 10. Serve with whipped cream if desired.


