THE DRUMS STILL BEAT ON N.E. 119TH STREET

What is with the skeleton playing the drums in the middle of the yard on NE 119th Street? Does he beat to a different drum? Spotting him each day, I decided to give him a name. I call him Jerry Garcia. Now those of you who are Dead Head fans know Jerry did not play the drums for Grateful Dead; he was the lead singer and guitarist. But it reminded me of how the band chose its name.



You see, the Grateful Dead band got their name from a dictionary entry about a folklore of a wanderer who stumbles across the corpse of a person who did not receive a proper burial because of unpaid debt. So, this wanderer gave his last penny to pay for the burial. The wanderer was later rewarded for the good dead by having their life saved by a person or animal who was actually the soul of the dead person that was buried. The reward was usually in the form of an organ donation. The band loved the meaning behind the term and decided to use it as their band name. I thought it appropriate to name the skeleton that because it reminds me of the lone traveler in search of a resting place, which he seems to have found in the yard on NE 119th Street. HISTORICAL EVENTS IN OCTOBER

October 1, 1946 - Twelve Nazi leaders were sentenced to death at the International War Crimes Tribunal in Nuremberg, Germany.

October 1, 1979 - After 70 years of American control, the Panama Canal Zone was formally handed over to Panama.

October 2, 1968 - California's Redwood National Park was established. Redwoods are the tallest of all trees, growing up to 400 feet (120 meters) during a lifetime that can span 2,000 years.

October 3, 1863 - President Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation designating the last Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day.

October 3, 1974 - Frank Robinson was hired by the Cleveland Indians as baseball's first African American major league manager.

October 4, 1957 - The Space Age began as the Russians launched the first satellite into orbit. Sputnik I weighed just 184 lbs. and transmitted a beeping radio signal for 21 days. The remarkable accomplishment by Soviet Russia sent a shockwave through the American political leadership resulting in U.S. efforts to be the first on the moon.

October 11, 1939 - Albert Einstein warned President Franklin D. Roosevelt that his theories could lead to Nazi Germany's development of an atomic bomb. Einstein suggested the U.S. develop its own bomb. This resulted in the top secret "Manhattan Project."

October 24, 1931 - Chicago gangster "Scarface" Al Capone was sentenced to 11 years in jail for Federal income tax evasion. In 1934, he was transferred to Alcatraz prison near San Francisco. He was paroled in 1939, suffering from syphilis. He retired to his mansion in Miami Beach where he died in 1947.

October 26, 1881 - The shoot-out at the O.K. Corral in Tombstone, Arizona, occurred between the feuding Clanton and Earp families. Wyatt Earp, two of his brothers and "Doc" Holliday gunned down two Clantons and two others

OCTOBER TASTY TIDBITS

CHEDDAR & GOUDA APPLE SOUP WITH CANDIED MAPLE BACON

INGREDIENTS

- large onion peeled, diced
- 1 1/2 Tbsp Chicken or Vegetable Broth
- 4 large diced apples
- 1 Tbsp maple syrup
- 4 Cups shredded cheddar (or more gouda)
- 1 1/4 Tsp black pepper
- 1/8- 1/s Tsp cayenne pepper (to taste)
- 1/4 Cup maple syrup
- 1/8 to 1/4 Tsp cayenne pepper
- 6 garlic cloves
- 4 Cups water
- 4 large diced potatoes
- 2 Cups shredded gouda
- 1 1/2 tsp Himalayan salt
- 1 Tsp smoked paprika
- 1 lb bacon
- 1/4 tsp smoked paprika



INSTRUCTIONS

1. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Place the bacon on a sheet pan lined with parchment paper and drizzle the maple syrup over the bacon. Then sprinkle the paprika and cayenne on before placing into the oven for 30 minutes.
2. In a large pot with the chicken bouillon base and water, add the onions, garlic, potatoes, and apples cook for 20-30 minutes on medium heat until the potatoes are softened.
3. Once everything is soft, use a hand immersion blender and puree until the soup is smooth. Then add the maple syrup, cheeses, salt, pepper, and spices. Reduce the heat to low and allow the cheese to melt.
4. Once the candied bacon is fully cooked, chop it up, and add it to the soup. Serve warm.
5. Store in a sealed container in the fridge for up to a week or in the freezer for one month.

PUMPKIN RICE KRISPIE TREATS

- 12 cups rice Krispies cereal
- 2 (10 oz) pkg. mini marshmallows
- 6 pretzel rods, end portions broken off into 2-inch pieces (so you'll have 12 pieces)
- Non-stick cooking spray
- 6 Tbsp salted butter
- Orange gel food coloring
- 12 mini green airhead candies



INSTRUCTIONS

1. Measure out rice Krispies and pour into a bowl. Melt butter in a pot over medium-low heat.
2. Add marshmallows and stir. As they begin to melt add in the gel food coloring until desired color is achieved. Stir constantly until marshmallows have melted.
3. Remove from heat and immediately pour in rice Krispies. Gently stir and fold with a spatula until cereal is evenly coated. Let mixture cool until you can handle with your hands.
4. Spray hands with non-stick cooking spray then shape rice Krispies treat mixture into balls about the size of a baseball. Insert 1 piece of the pretzel rod into the top center and reshape the pumpkin as needed. Transfer to a plate or dish sprayed lightly with cooking spray.
5. Beginning on one side of the airhead candy cut out a leaf shape with clean scissors then use the remaining portion of the piece of candy to roll and shape into a thin rope shape then twist into a vine shape.
6. Place candy on the sides of each pretzel on the pumpkin (as pictured). Repeat with remaining candy. Store in an airtight container.

1. FORMED BY GLACIERS

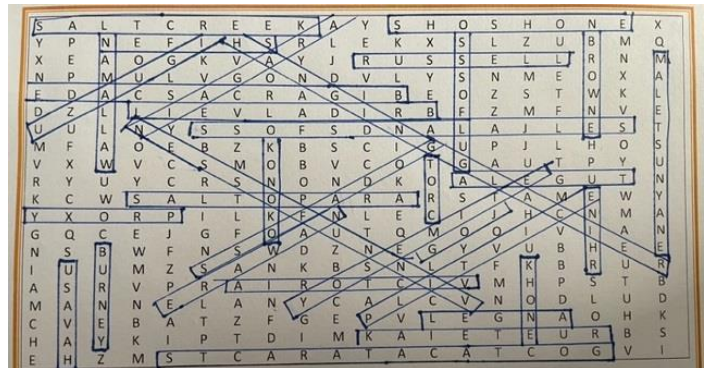
